School events this week

SYF&R visit Year 3 at WPSPS

On Monday afternoon, our Year 3s had some special visitors – members of the *South Yorkshire Fire and Rescue Services*. The children listened ever so intently and had some great answers to their questions. They really showed a strong understanding of what fire people do and what they can help with. They had great ideas about rescuing animals, saving people from burning buildings and removing people from cars in accidents.

The two characters, 'Bleeper' and 'Battery' (aka a smoke alarm) gave them insightful information about how the children can keep themselves safe, including information about water safety and never going in open waters when out and about in the community. They taught us how the service helps rescue cows if they fall in ditches, fits fire alarms in people's homes and also does lots of support work teaching children and young people about how to keep themselves safe. We discussed fire lighters / matches and how only adults are allowed to start fires in our home eg lighting a candle on a cake, lighting a log burner etc. We discussed scenarios like what we would do if we went to our friend's house and saw a lighter on the floor. Thankfully all of the children thought it would be best to tell an adult.

We also discussed good and bad fires which adults can light – including cooking, candles and fireworks. We decided that even a good fire could turn in to a bad fire, which is why we must be so very careful. The service also discussed the importance of fire drills in schools and r-iterated the importance of these. They agreed with us that these must be done silently so as adults can clearly communicate.

Top tips for parents (these might be useful for all parents!):

- One top tip for was that when using sparklers, always pop the sharp end of the sparkler in a carrot, in which case a hand can never get burnt by the hot sparkler!
- Teach your children the **'Stop, Drop and Roll!' method:** the fire service spoke about the importance of remembering this motto and Lewis in Team SG did a great job in modelling this for the other boys and girls to learn from (always rolling both ways to make sure all of the flames are eradicated). The service set some homework for the children and they have been asked to show someone at home how to do this too!

- Try to make sure your house is kitted out with smoke alarms again the children have been asked to check their houses for these and make you adults check them at least once a week! ... A bit of homework for you too!
- Make sure you have an escape or safety plan and have all downstairs doors closed during the night to limit any spread of smoke / fire.
- Don't worry about your pets in cases of fire, they would find their own way out!
- Make sure your children all know their full address, including their post code as this is really important if they ever have to phone 999 in an emergency.
- For safe travels, always ensure everyone in the car has a seatbelt on and ensure children are in a car seat if they are less than 1.4m tall. Try to make sure there are limited distractions so you can focus on your driving...the children will be making sure you adhere to the rules!

Whilst it was our Year 3s who had this opportunity, I wanted to share the information and learning with parents, in case you would like to follow any of this up at home with your child.

The children LOVED this experience and thoroughly enjoyed showing off their knowledge in the Quiz at the end of the session!

Assembly time to develop your child:

This Monday's 'Significant Person' assembly was all about Elton John. The children learnt all about his early life and why he chose the career he did. They listened to some of his music and watched him in action in Maddison Square Gardens! We related his characters to those of ours at WPSPS and we felt that he was **creative**, **confident** and showed real **ambition** as a performer!

In our class collective worship time this week, teams were tasked with discussing together the importance of online safety and how children can keep themselves safe when in and out of school. Please follow this up with your child at home.

In Thursday's assembly we discussed 'Safety' and what makes the children feel safe both at home, but also in school. Thankfully 100% of the children feel safe in school and could articulate why. Reasons ranged from having adults to talk to and look after them, friendly, smiley staff, good friends who respect them and look after each other. The children could also talk about physical things in school that kept them safe eg fire drill practices etc. We read 'Superheroes don't need hugs' and decided that hugs can always make us feel safe and better!
