Dear Parents / Carers.

Newsletter – Spring 1

I hope you have all had a happy start to 2023. We have had an exciting spring term at Park Street, with lots of activities and opportunities to enrich school life for the children. I hope you enjoy reading about them below!

COVID-19

Thank you for your continued support of the school in recent months. The spring term has once again appeared fairly settled, with only a small number of children and staff testing positive for COVID-19.

Whilst the Government guidance continues to be limited, we appreciate parents and families that continue to remain vigilant and follow the Government guidance which Park Street continues to adopt. This means if your child tests positive for COVID-19 then we ask that they self-isolate for three days or until they are well enough to come to school. THANK YOU.

Should you have any queries or doubts in your mind then please phone school and discuss your situation with the Admin team. They will refer in to the Senior Leadership Team for advice and support.

Should you yourself as parent have to self-isolate, there is always the option to drop off / pick up later at the top of the drive, to limit your contact with others, if this helps you to be able to distance and isolate a little whilst on school grounds.

Attendance Policy

As you will be aware, we continue to be proactive and adopt a policy which promotes excellent attendance and punctuality, so all children can thrive and achieve their best.

We know that from time to time, your child may become unwell. Whatever your child's illness we ask that you let school know at your earliest convenience and **keep us informed each day of their absence**. Should you wish to discuss any illnesses then the school's Admin team or our Parent Support Advisor, Mrs Hitchens, will be able to help and offer advice.

Our school continues to work hard to ensure three-day absence visits are completed by our SLT / PSA, wherever possible. These are only made as a measure of support for families.

Punctuality:

Your child should always be at school for 8.40am and should report to the main school entrance if they arrive later than 8.45am, when the playground gates close. Lateness has a clear detrimental impact on the children as they miss learning when they are at their most alert! Plus, being on time is a life skill...we don't often get away with it in the work place, so it is important we teach the children this skill early in life, to prepare them fully for their future.

We are pleased to see that as a result of our hard work with parents, there are far fewer children arriving at school late this half term! **Well done TEAM Park Street!**

The Attendance Team and the systems we have in place:

Our Attendance Lead, **Mrs Green**, continues to work with **Mrs Julie Marsh**, our Education Welfare Officer. They liaise on a two-weekly basis regarding families which are causing concern and provide early intervention. This may involve a phone call from either of them to discuss a fall or concern in attendance / punctuality, then a letter or a home visit if there is further discussion needed. If matters do not improve, then families will be asked to meet with the Attendance Team and SLT in school, sometimes alongside Mrs Chavan (School Governor responsible for Attendance). We hope this reassures families and shows the school's tenacious approach. If matters improve, we of course thank and congratulate families and children too!

Holidays:

Holidays taken in term time will <u>not</u> be authorised unless there are extra special reasons. We will provide any families who go on unauthorised holidays with a follow up letter to demonstrate the impact of the holiday on their child's education. We understand desperately the impact that the last few years has had on everyone's mental health and wellbeing, but our policy remains tight and robust and it is the law that children attend school regularly.

Please can I also remind parents that:

- if your child is attending a funeral, then a 'Leave of Absence' form still needs to be completed
- if you need to fill a 'Leave of Absence' form in, then please put as much information as possible so as the best decision can be made by the Attendance Team.

Uniform Policy

If any families are in need of support with school uniform then please simply mention this to Mrs C Hitchens (PSA). We have a stock of uniform down at The Salvation Army site, which parents in need can access.

Please note the following important points:

- Leggings are not part of the school uniform so please ensure these are avoided.
- Children also should not wear makeup for school, or false nails.
- Children are not expected to have hair dye in their hair for school, or any over the top hairstyles which may distract learning.
- Children should not be coming to school wearing items of jewellery eg bracelets / necklaces.
- **PE**: your child's team has set PE days when they complete their PE lessons. However, some weeks due to staff absence, school trips, school events etc, these lessons may be moved around. So, we always suggest that your child brings their PE kit to school on a Monday morning, leaves it in school for the duration of the week on their coat peg and then takes it home on a Friday afternoon to be washed over the weekend (and back again for Monday morning)!
- As the summer months will soon arrive, please note that grey shorts may be worn for school or blue/burgundy checked summer dresses.

Lost property

Items of clothing are sometimes misplaced by children, especially when they are busy playing! Please could you ensure all items are clearly marked/labelled up with your child's name - this will make it easier to locate any missing items and re-unite them with their owner.




Lost property is placed in the baskets in the entrance of school, should you need to try to locate a piece of uniform.

Reading expectations at Park Street

As you know, at Park Street we love reading and value the importance of this on a child's academic attainment, progress and love of school life. After all, if you can read, you can do anything!



Please note that if your child attends Park Street, we have the following high expectations:

- Your child should take their reading book and reading record home each evening and read for up to 10 minutes. This can be done independently, if your child is able to.
- An adult from home should initial / sign each day, to let staff know that their child has read.
- Books and records should be returned each morning for staff to track and check and celebrate daily readers on classroom displays.
- Teachers will let parents know if books have not been returned, through consistent notes home.

Your support in this is massively appreciated! We must always keep encouraging our children to read. It opens doors to all areas of learning and adds such fun to their lives. If your child is a reluctant reader, then please do speak to your child's class teacher about ideas which they use to engage children in class.

A few reminders for parents...

- The drive should not be accessed by parents / carers during the times of 8.20-9am and 2.30-3.30pm unless you have a permit
- The speed limit on the drive is 15mph please respect this all of the time, even if it is not busy, as school staff and children continually use the drive and surrounding areas for PE and at playtimes/lunchtimes
- The yellow lines at the bottom of the drive and on the main road should not be used to park on
- Gates to the playground close at 8.45am, at which time all children should be in lessons, learning.
 Any children arriving after this time should be accompanied by an adult to the main school entrance and signed in as 'late'
- Children should be in school for the full day; we ask that parents do not just come to school to collect their child from the main entrance, unless it is in an emergency or for a pre-planned emergency medical appointment, for example, which we know about beforehand.

PARENTS: could your child qualify for 'free school meals'?

If you think that your child may be eligible for 'free school meals' then please consult the following page and apply immediately:

Should you need any help / support in reading or completing such paperwork, then please either mention this to our Admin Team either by phone or email and a member of staff will be organised to help and support. We have done this very successfully for a number of parents to date. This helps you out and also helps school out too, with opportunities for more funding to help support your child.

The site states that your child could benefit from these if you receive:

- income Support
- income-based Jobseekers Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit with an annual income of less than £16,190, provided you are not receiving Working Tax Credit
- the 'guaranteed' element of the State Pension Credit
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
- Universal Credit with an annual net earned income threshold of less than £7,400
- support under part six of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.



'Reading Together' continues each Tuesday!

Many thanks to Miss McGinnes, our Reading Leader in school, who has continued to organise for the EYFS and Year 1 'Reading Together' sessions to continue this spring term.

This is an excellent opportunity for parents and children and is open to parents of children in Nursery, Reception and Year 1 – Teams CM (AM and PM); CW, EO and CH. Session times are:

Every Tuesday afternoon from 2.45pm until 3.15pm NB: for morning Nursery children, this will be at 10.45am until 11.15am

No booking, just turn up and enjoy! We ask for only one adult per child to attend. The event is held in the school's main Hall, which you can access though the main Reception area.

For those parents who continually attend – thank you! It is making a huge impact on your child's reading progress!

D - Democracy


R - Rule of law

- 4. Be open with praise giving
- 5. Focus on the mission, vision and goals of our school
- 6. Take the time to learn about each other's likes, dislikes and personal goals
- 7. Celebrate milestones and achievements
- 8. Treat people with courtesy, politeness, and kindness
- 9. Encourage each other to convey opinions and ideas
- 10. Listen to what other people have to mention before expressing our own viewpoint. Never talk over or disrupt someone else
- 11. Use peoples' ideas to alter or improve work
- 12. Never insult, name-call, disparage, or belittle individuals or their thoughts
- 13. Do not constantly criticise or judge each other.

Chinese New Year celebrations in school - the year of the Rabbit & 'Wear it Red Day' - £1 contribution for RE resources - 20.01.23

In January, Mr Holmes (RE / Community Cohesion Leader) organised for the school to 'wear it red' on 20.01.23, to celebrate the Chinese New Year! We all wore red and learnt various knowledge about China and their beliefs.

Nursery enjoyed a wonderful dragon parade through school!

In Team CW they explored Chinese New Year from CBeebies "let's celebrate" and watched dragon dancing. Team CW talked about the year of the rabbit and had lots opportunities in provision for making lanterns, dragon puppets, writing Chinese numbers and letters.



In Team EO they learnt about how the Chinese New Year is also known as the 'Spring Festival' in China as it marks the end of winter and beginning of Spring and last for 15 days! They learnt how red is seen to be a lucky colour and on New Years' Day children wake up to a red envelope under their pillows with money and sweets enclosed. They took part in paper cutting, a traditional art in China and made paper lanterns in their creative area. They also learnt how to say 'hello' (Nǐ hǎo) in Mandarin!

In Team CH they re-told the story of the legend of Chines new year:https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/topics/z9k996f/articles/z2byvwx.

After this, they talked about things they might expect to see - things like loud noises, bright red colours and flames, all things that keep the Monster Nian away during the New Year celebrations in China. Next, they listened to a video about a 12-year-old girl, named Angela who was from China. Angela explained why the Chinese New Year is so important, when and how it is celebrated. They were able to make lots of connections to the story and to what Angela was showing them. They also noticed some things we do the same during our new year celebrations, like spending time with family and watching the fireworks. Finally, they re-told a familiar story about the 12 animals that raced for the honour to have a year named after them and they wrote the Chinese word for Rabbit.

In Team JF the children explored Chinese New Year, by exploring the range of animals used and discussed, from the cycle, how they knew it was the year of the 'rabbit'. From this, they read the story of how animals became significant and gained a better understanding of this tradition. As it is the year of the rabbit they identified what this means and how it symbolises many things. After lots of discussion and finding out their own birth years, they created a poster in groups.

In Team HG they re-capped the Chinese zodiac and the animal of the year in which they were born. This week they looked at the 15 days of preparation, celebration and worship. They watched a video of last year's dazzling dragon dance performance (in London) and then made origami dragon heads as a keepsake.

This amazing learning was fabulous to be part of and really well enjoyed by all of our Park Street boys and girls. Thanks to all of the parents who paid a voluntary contribution of £1 for the day, to help raise money for RE resources through school. Mr Holmes was very happy to purchase the RE resources below, for the children to use:

Team CW and the Reception children from Team EO received a visit from Reverend John Armstrong and Lay Minister Stephanie Peake from St Mary's Church in Wombwell in January. They explained their roles in the church, what church is like and answered some brilliant questions from the children. They visited again in February and talked about the Bible and read a story from it. The children were each presented with a Bible so they can read the stories at home.

Year 5 continue their 'Mini Police' programme in session 3 – 07.02.23

This half term our 'Mini Police' have continued their hard work with representatives from SYP, focusing on the theme of 'communication'. Statutory Tests for this academic year 2022-23

Please, once again, note the following dates for the statutory assessment dates for 2022-23. Hopefully this will help families ensure their children are in school for these very important times. I am sure you will agree that the children are encouraged to work hard during the course of the year and it would be a shame for them not to experience success in such opportunities. Such assessments prepare the children well for later in life and also help the school in progressing and moving forward to greater success.

The dates for 2022-23 are as follows:

- ➤ If your child will be in Year 1 during 2022-23, their Phonics Screen Check will be during the week commencing Monday 12th June 2023.
- ➤ If your child will be in Year 2 during 2022-23, their Key Stage 1 tests will be during the month of May 2023.
- ➤ If your child will be in Year 4 during 2022-23, their Multiplication tables check will be during the two-week window, week commencing Monday 5th June 2023.
- ➤ If your child will be in Year 6 during 2022-23, their Key Stage 2 tests will be during the week commencing Monday 8th May 2023 and will be organised in line with national requirements:

Tuesday 9th May – English Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar Papers 1 and 2 Wednesday 10th May – English Reading Paper Thursday 11th May – Mathematics Paper 1 and 2

Friday 12th May – Mathematics Paper 3

NB these dates have been amended due to the Government's decision to place a bank holiday for the King's coronation on Monday 8th May 2023.

If you feel that your child would benefit from school support, then the above email is also the correct one to email, to enquire.

Mr Fidment is currently running a 'Thinking Differently' programme in school, but despite the need for it there has been a low uptake. This is a positive parenting course specifically for parents of children with ASD /



ADHD diagnoses (or potential diagnoses). If you are interested in attending this course in the future, to support you at home, please do email Mr Fidment using the SENDCo email above.

PSA Information



As many of you will know, Mrs Hitchens is our school's Parent Support Advisor (PSA). Her role is to support parents, by providing support, advice and training, so as you are able to fully meet the needs of your child(ren). Mrs Hitchens has had lots of training in areas such as positive parenting, bereavement, attendance, ASD/ADHD and 'getting back in to work'. Mrs Hitchens wears many hats through school and support the safeguarding and attendance teams alike. She also works with our Parental Group and hols regular coffee mornings.

Our Reception and Reception / 1 classes have had members of our school community (parents and grandparents) in class to talk about their jobs.

SLT are planning opportunities for parents who have shown willing, to come in to school to discuss their roles with the children, to develop aspiration and awareness of possible roles.

Year 5 children have taken part in the Mini Police programme to raise awareness of such roles and the importance of them.

Year 3 have received a talk from SYP regarding the significance of fire safety awareness.

Year 6 have visited Crucial Crew, to receive information about life experiences but also to make them aware of the different roles people take on in society. Year 6 have also visited Netherwood to discuss transition and next steps in their learning journey.

Weekly assemblies which focus on 'significant people' from the past encourage children to challenge gender stereotypes and achieve their own personal goals.

COMPASS welcomed in to school to support children in need.

HLTA delivers Art Therapy 1.5 days a week to support children's mental health and wellbeing.

A few top tip safeguarding reminders for parents to be aware of:

- The age of criminal responsibility is 10 and both children and parents ought to know this, especially with online activity. Please always ensure you are aware of your child's actions and discuss this legality with your child openly.
- The Dark Web: recent safeguarding training has informed staff that primary aged children are now accessing 'The Dark Web' and accessing material which is indecent for children of such an age to be exposed to. As a result, we have implemented a half termly online safety assembly for KS1 ad 2 and a weekly Team collective worship to discuss the importance of keeping safe online. Please ensure you are monitoring your child's online usage at home and discussing the importance of never accessing online material which is inappropriate for their age / stage. We will continue to always be in contact with parents if we suspect there is any online safety issue.
