



COVID-19: Outbreak Management Plan

Wombwell Park Street Primary School September 2021

1. Introduction

This plan is based on the <u>contingency framework for managing local outbreaks</u> of COVID-19 and the <u>schools operational guidance from step 4</u>, provided by the Department for Education (DfE).

We will only implement some, or all, of the measures in this plan in response to recommendations provided by our local authority (LA), director of public health (DsPH), Public Health England (PHE) Health Protection team or the national government.

It may be necessary to implement these measures in the following circumstances, for example:

- To help manage a COVID-19 outbreak within the school
- If COVID-19 infection rates in the community are extremely high, and other measures have failed to reduce transmission
- As part of a package of measures responding to a 'variant of concern' (VoC).

The impact of having missed education during the pandemic is still unknown for many children and adults. It is clear however that there is still work to be done to ensure all children are where they should be academically and that any gaps in their attainment and progress are being rapidly addressed.

This Covid-19 Outbreak Management Plan describes what Wombwell Park Street Primary School (WPSPS) would do if children, pupils, students or staff test positive for COVID-19, or how they would operate if they were advised to reintroduce control measures to help break chains of transmission.

Any control measures put in place will be regularly reviewed and changed as and when it is safe to do so. Schools will continue to respond to the evidence being provided at a local and national level and act accordingly in line with guidance.

Aims of the plan:

To ensure that WPSPS continues to provide high quality Education whilst providing a safe working and learning environment for staff and students

To aid the prevention and mitigation of the spread of Covid-19 cases by through effective engagement with our community on Government, public health and school rules

To support the health and wellbeing of students and staff who become infected, and their contacts, in line with current Government guidance.

To prepare for any community or school outbreak in partnership with BMBC, NHS and PHE.

To support staff and students beyond immediate outbreak control (health and wellbeing, equality, diversity, and inclusion).

To identify strategic ownership and leadership of the School's Outbreak Management Plan and clear escalation protocols.

School's Roles and Responsibilities

WPSPS has responsibility for ensuring basic infection prevention and control measures are in place, as per the national guidance.

WPSPS has responsibility for implementing secure data management systems to keep a record of confirmed cases. Ensuring that managers recognise the sensitive personal nature of this information and that it is collected ethically and securely, with the appropriate governance, regulatory and security measures in place.

WPSPS has responsibility for updating school specific Covid-19 risk assessments in line with national guidance. Covid-19 risk assessments are updated in consultation with School Leaders and BMBC colleagues where necessary. Risk assessments should be in place for vulnerable individuals (clinically vulnerable, pregnant women and BAME).

WPSPS has a responsibility to ensure Lateral Flow Test (LFT) home testing kits are provided to staff for twice a week testing, and to pupils where consented.

The school's SLT have responsibility for the updating, implementation, and evaluation of this Plan.

2. Guidance

WPSPS School will continue to respond to the latest guidance and advice from:

National Government Public Health England (PHE) Local Authority Public Health (Barnsley Council) Department for Education

Any member of the school community (children, pupils, staff and other adults) should not attend the setting if they:

- Have any of the main Covid-19 symptoms (i.e., a high temperature (37.8 or higher), a new, continuous cough and a loss or change to sense of smell or taste).
- Have tested positive for Covid-19 (less than 11 days ago).
- · Have been contacted through NHS Test and Trace and been advised to stay at home, unless exempt from self-isolation-

Asymptomatic contacts do not need to self-isolate if either:

- they're under 18
- they had their second vaccine dose from the NHS more than 14 days ago.

Single Confirmed Covid-19 Case

If there is a single positive case identified in an individual attending WPSPS the setting does not need to notify any other agency.

The school may seek support from the DfE helpline if necessary (accessible 7 days a week) 0800 046 8687 (option 1) or the DfE Portal.

The following steps will be taken in line with the latest guidance:

- All contact tracing will be undertaken by NHS Test and Trace.
- From 16 August 2021, asymptomatic children under the age of 18 years old will no longer be required to self-isolate if they are contacted by NHS Test and Trace as a close contact of a positive COVID-19 case. Instead, they will be informed that they have been in close contact with a positive case and advised to take a PCR test. We would encourage all individuals to take a PCR test if advised to do so.
- A remote learning plan will be implemented for those isolating.
- From 16 August 2021, asymptomatic staff members who are fully vaccinated will also not need to self-isolate following close contact with a positive case. They will however be asked to take a Lateral Flow Test/ PCR test before returning to school.
- Any individual who has symptoms or who has tested positive for Covid-19 must self-isolate in line with Government guidance.

All settings should seek advice if a pupil or staff member is admitted to hospital with Covid-19. They can do this by phoning the DfE helpline (0800 046 8687, option 1). Hospitalisation could indicate increased severity of illness or a new VoC. Settings may be offered public health support in managing risk assessments and communicating with staff and parents.

Multiple Confirmed Covid-19 Cases

If there are multiple linked confirmed cases amongst individuals attending WPSPS within 14 days, the school may have an outbreak.

The school may seek support from the BMBC Children and Young People's Public Health team via Covid19childrenandeducationreporting@barnsley.gov.uk when one of the following thresholds is reached:

- For most education and childcare settings, whichever of these thresholds is reached first:
 - o 5 children, pupils, students or staff, who are likely to have mixed closely, test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period; OR
 - o 10% of children, pupils, students or staff who are likely to have mixed closely test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period (35 children).

The school will work in collaboration with BMBC Public Health to reach a decision around what measures may need to be put in place in line with this plan.

3. Measures that School has planned for

The table below outlines: measures that may be reintroduced following a discussion with BMBC Public Health; actions to be taken to put the measure in place quickly; how WPSPS would ensure every pupil receives the quantity and quality of education and support to which they are normally entitled; and how changes would be communicated with children, parents, carers and staff.

The Government's Covid-19 Contingency Framework for education and childcare settings has been used to complete the table below (from page 12).

4. Control Measures

Ensure good hygiene for everyone: frequent and thorough hand cleaning is regular practice and will be continued. Staff will ensure children continue to clean their hands regularly with soap and water / hand sanitizer. The 'Catch it, bin it, kill it' approach will continued to be adhered to by staff and children. PPE will continue to be available to staff should they wish to (eg in crowded spaces or when providing intimate care).

Maintain appropriate cleaning regimes: cleaning sprays will still be provided at 8am each morning by the caretaker, for staff to use as they see fit in class (eg on frequently touched surfaces). Twice daily cleans on hot spot areas will be completed by the Caretaker.

Keep occupied spaces well ventilated: staff will continue to ensure that spaces in school are well ventilated, whilst ensuring a comfortable teaching environment is maintained.

Follow Public health England advice on testing, self-isolation and managing confirmed cases of COVID-19 (as above).

4. Attendance restrictions

Attendance restrictions will only be recommended as a last resort. If recommended, we will implement the measures in this section.

Eligibility to remain in school

In the first instance, we will stay open for:

- Vulnerable children
- Children of critical key workers
- Reception, Year 1, Year 2 and Year 6 children

If further restrictions are recommended, we will stay open for:

- Vulnerable children
- Children of critical key workers

Education and support for pupils at home

If children are off school due to having a positive PCR for COVID-19, or are identified as a close contact and therefore have to self-isolate for 10 days, then teachers will ensure work which mirrors that which is being completed in class, is posted on Seesaw. Remote learning on Zoom may also be used to help support the children when possible, depending on the situation.

5. Safeguarding

We will review our child protection policy to make sure it reflects the local restrictions and remains effective.

We will aim to have a trained DSL (Designated Safeguarding Lead) or deputy DSL on site wherever possible.

If our DSL (or deputy) can't be on site, then they can be contacted remotely through their school email or mobile phone.

On occasions where there is no DSL or deputy on site, the most senior leader on site will take responsibility for co-ordinating safeguarding on site and liaise with DSLs/Deputies or other staff trained to the standard of DSLs/Deputies.
